<p>It is for the school and its Governors to decide how the PPG is spent, as we are best placed to assess what additional provision should be made for individual pupils in school to help to 'narrow the gaps' and support pupils making good progress throughout the school. As a school we are very conscientious of our duty to spend the PPG to impact on the targeted pupils in such a way that it does not openly identify them or discriminate against others. Therefore Pupil Premium spending primarily designed to impact on PPG pupils are opened to all pupils who were deemed to have the same needs. Hence in addition to direct spending on PPG pupils much of this spending has also directly or indirectly impacted positively on other children's attainment and pastoral care.</p>
